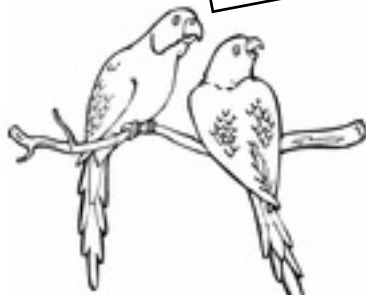
Greetings from the Student Life Staff!

We'll see you soon!

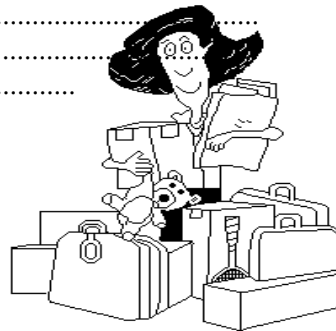

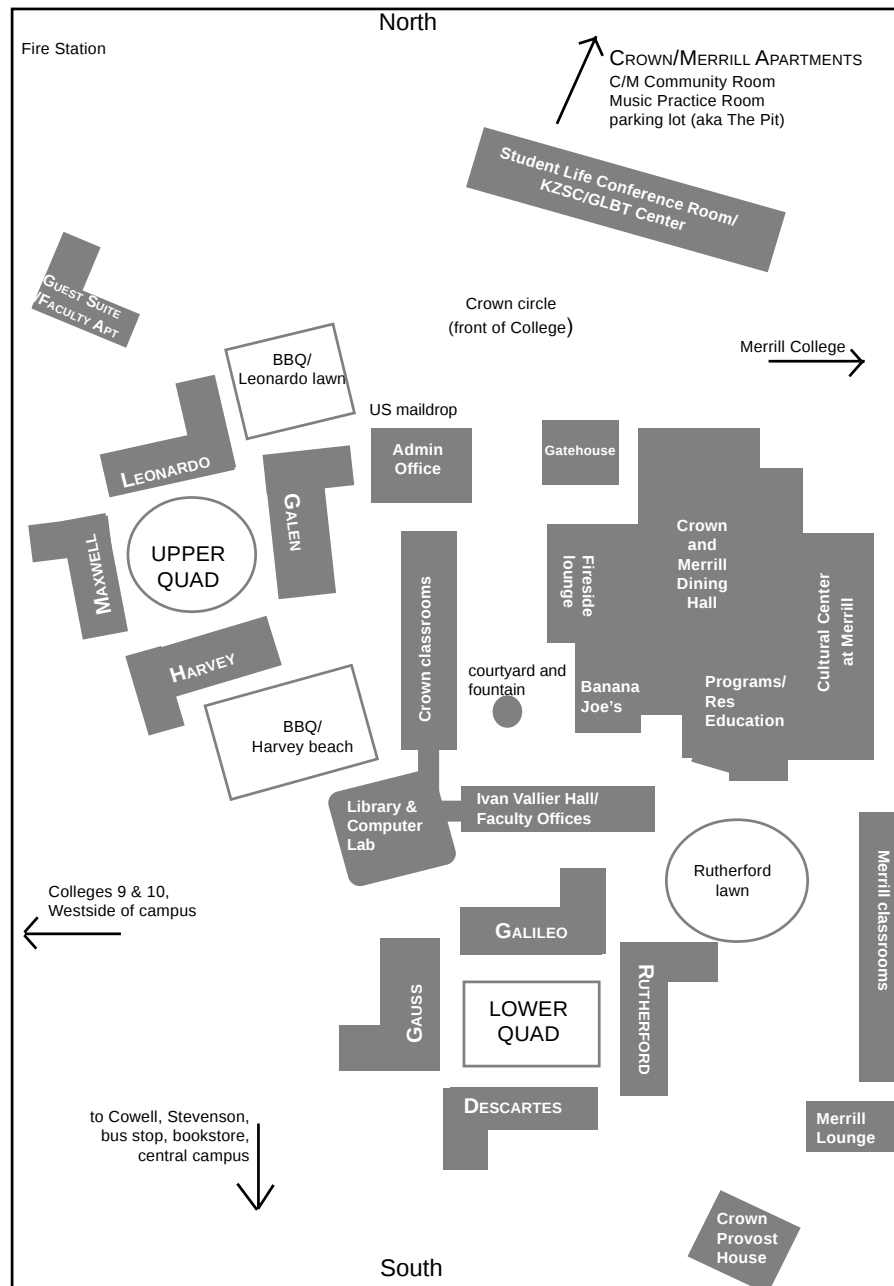

Residence Halls

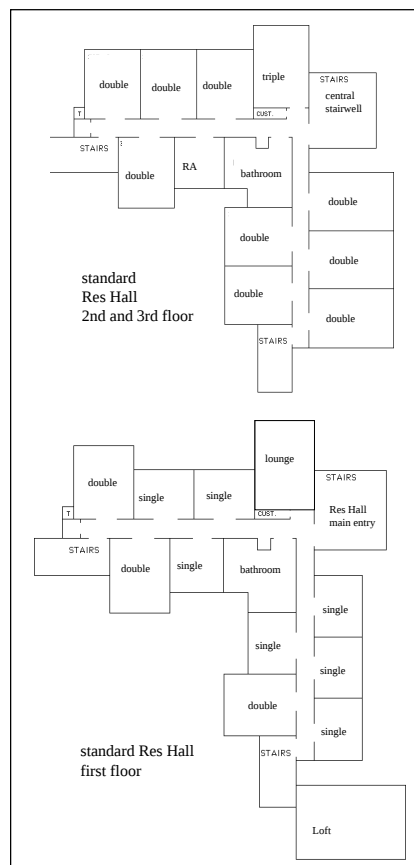


If you have been assigned to a Residence Hall room, you will be affiliated with one of our eight traditional white stucco buildings. The four houses in each quad face center and house in each 58-60 students of all class levels. Lower quad shares a cobbled courtyard with shady green trees while the upper quad centers an open grassy knoll framed by trees and flowers. No matter where you are placed, you will be only a few steps from the Dining Hall, mailroom, and the College offices.

All of our residence halls are smoke-free.

There are two **Resident Advisors (RAs)** in your building to assist in creating a comfortable living environment. Each residence hall is three stories and shaped like an L. Each wing has 6-11 residents, with a bathroom in the middle. There is an indoor central stairwell and an outdoor side stairwell on each end of the building.

Each house has a lounge on the first floor used for meetings, studying, and socializing. In the basement is the laundry room. Some of the houses also have locked rooms for bicycle storage, while others have places by the front door to lock bicycles.





We are committed to students' academic success and creating an environment for learning in all of our buildings.

We have one **all-female floor** per quad. If you have been assigned to an all-female floor, all the rooms are occupied by females and the bathroom is for women only. Women from the other floors in the building are also welcome to use this bathroom. Male visitors will need to use one of the other bathrooms.

We have two **Transfer Student** floors for our incoming upper division students who would like to be part of the active residential community, yet maintain a more concentrated quiet environment.

This year, we have also created the **Academic Focus House** as an intensive study environment for students from all majors who possess a love for learning. Students are committed to a 24 hour courtesy quiet hour environment and academic pursuits. In addition, the building houses our **Science Learning Community (SLC)**, a program in conjunction with the Academic Excellence Program (ACE), for a limited number of incoming Crown frosh who will be taking the beginning Chemistry course during Fall Quarter. The intent of the program is to support students who are interested in pursuing majors in the sciences and may need extra support in chemistry. Students will live together in a residence hall on a floor mixed with students who tested out of the program, but have expressed an interest in pursuing the sciences.

Not only do we encourage academic success, but developmental growth as well. Crown is also active in the community. Due to a large response, we have created the **Outdoor Pursuits floor**, offering the opportunity for residents to organize outdoor excursions, learn new skills and teach peers in a personal area of expertise. Residents will have the opportunity to participate in activities coordinated through OPERS like hiking or backpacking and are also encouraged to spend time giving back to the outdoors through service events such as beach clean ups, trail maintenance, and other local conservation efforts.

We're excited about our Residence Halls and welcome your involvement in making your year a fun and productive one!

named after Leonardo da Vinci, (1452-1519) Italian mathematician. Painter of the Mona Lisa



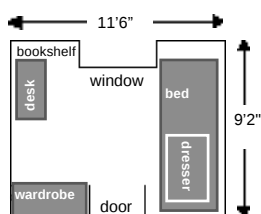
MAXWELL HOUSE

Res Hall Room Types (all rates are per person)

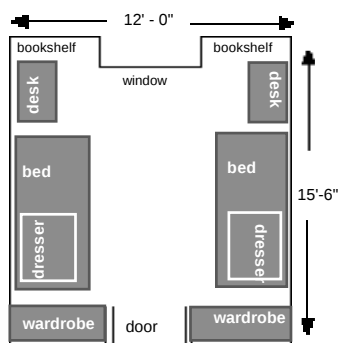
SINGLE ROOM (1 resident/room).

There are 8 single rooms per building. Singles are 120 sq feet (9'2" x 11'6").



DOUBLE ROOM (2 residents/room).

The majority of the rooms in the hall are double rooms. Doubles are 180 sq feet (15' x 12').

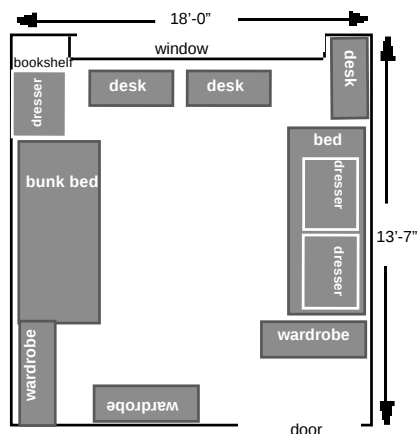


TRIPLE LOFT (3 residents/room).

There is one in every house except Rutherford and Leonardo. The split level includes a bathroom. The lower level is 162.4 sq feet and the upper level is 73.9 sq feet.

TRIPLE ROOM (3 residents/room).

There is one triple room on the 2nd and 3rd floors of each hall that are about 244.4 sq feet (18' x 13'7").



GUEST SUITE (2 residents).

One large double bedroom with a private bathroom next door to the Faculty Apartment. Residents have access to Leonardo laundry room and events.

FACULTY APARTMENT (4 residents).

Two double rooms in a small private apartment by Leonardo. The apartment includes a kitchen, a living room, and a bathroom. Residents have access to Leonardo laundry room and events.

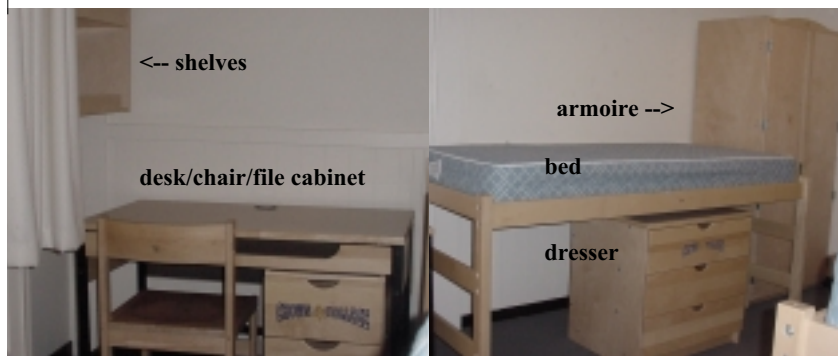

Each room has at least one 10 Base-T ethernet line and one telephone jack. All rooms are carpeted and have curtains, a soft fluorescent overhead light, and a wall heater.

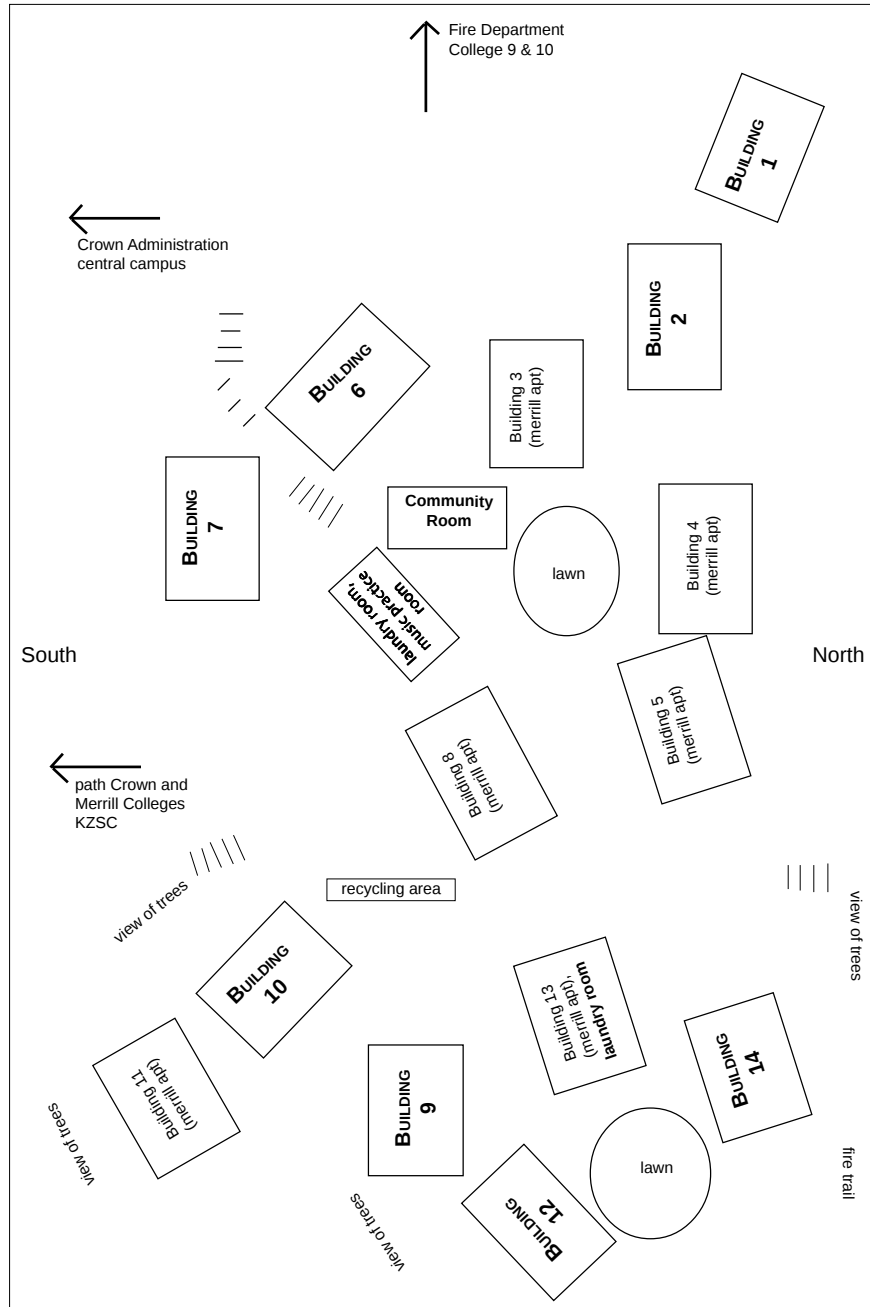
In the bathroom, we provide:
shower curtain, toilet paper, cubby holes for storage and morning cleaning service (we do not provide service for the lofts, Guest Suite, or Faculty Apartment private bathrooms).

Faculty Apartment will also have:
love seat, end table, lamp, full fridge, stove/oven, recycling bins, dining room table, dining room chairs, coffee table, medicine cabinet.

Crown/Merrill Apartments

If you have been assigned to a Crown/Merrill Apartment (CMA), you will be in one of 8 buildings in the complex.

Most of our apartments were picked during Room Selection held in the Spring, giving priority to our continuing student population. Any vacant apartment spaces were assigned to transfer students. We do not house frosh (first year students) in the apartment complex.

Apartment households are usually a mix of genders (unless specifically requested on the application), but the bedrooms remain single sex. When a space opens in the apartment, we will attempt to fill it with the best fit and expect that all residents in the apartment will be open to accepting a new housemate.

There is one **Resident Advisor** for every 2 buildings (called a cluster). As in the res halls, RAs work to provide a positive community environment. The RAs can assist household success by working with residents to create household agreements and mediate conflicts. RAs also provide programming along with the **Programming Assistants** (PA) who work to create programs for all the Crown community.

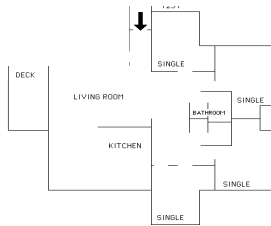


Each three-story building has 2 or 3 apartments per floor. Each apartment has 4 to 5 housemates in different bedroom configurations. There are no shared walls between double and triple bedrooms, and all doors are solid core with metal jams for maximum privacy. Each apartment includes a kitchen, living room/study area, dining room, bathroom (split with a sink/shower on one side and a sink/toilet on the other side), and outside deck.

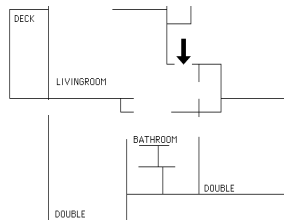
All the apartments receive some sun during the day although some may be more shaded due to the surrounding trees. There is ample storage for each resident, free cable access and ResNet connections.

Apt Room Types

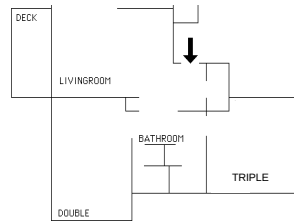
Quartet: 4 single bedrooms



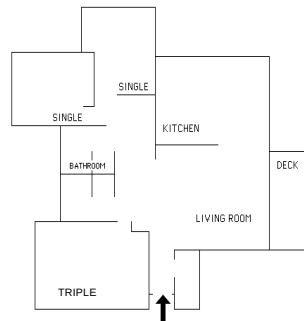
Quartet: 2 double bedrooms

If you are assigned to an apartment single that means you are the only person assigned to that bedroom. In an apartment double, there are 2 people assigned. In an apartment triple, there are 3 people assigned. There is one desk and chair that is in the living room for a 5-person apartment. Furniture is not preassigned.

The guiding philosophy of the Crown/Merrill Apartment complex is that of cooperative living with each individual's participation playing a key role. All students are required to participate in the maintenance of their surroundings and maintain a quiet residential environment in accordance with courtesy/quiet hour policies. Quarterly cleaning/safety inspections are conducted of apartment common areas, and a fire inspection is conducted during the Winter Break.

Living in the Apartments? We suggest you discuss...

It's important to sit down and talk through a household agreement with your new housemates to develop a comfortable living environment. Here are some questions to ask:

Cleaning Schedule: How long should dishes be allowed to sit in the sink? Set up a weekly chore wheel or quarterly assignments.

Cooking/shopping: Community cooking and shopping? Is anyone a vegetarian? Religious needs regarding use of pots and pans?

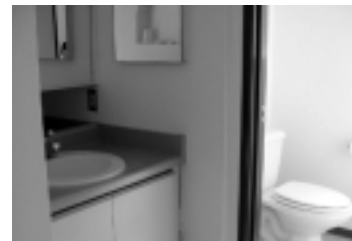
Noise: Discuss sleep and study habits.

Guests: Overnight guests of any kind? how much advance warning? Use of community property?

Borrowing Possessions: borrowing items with or without asking, especially food and clothing.

Messages/Communication: When there is conflict, preferred method to discuss issues. Sharing phones. Corkboard for messages.

We also encourage you to contact your housemates before you arrive to discuss what to bring to avoid duplicate communal use items.

**MOVE IN DAY ONE
NEW FROSH AND TRANSFER STUDENTS
Friday, September 16, 2005**

The campus is open for regular business on Friday so we need to work together to make move-in as smooth and stress free as possible. We ask that you not arrive before your scheduled time. If you are not able to make it within your assigned **2 hour** window, you may be asked to wait until we get other residents checked in.

If you are a new student assigned to live at Crown, you are invited to move in on Friday, September 16. Just follow the signs at the base of campus for **EAST MOVE IN**.

First stop is in the East Remote parking lot:

- 1) **You (the student) must show your red Check-in tag and a picture ID** (driver's license, passport, student ID card, credit card) at the table to pick up your key.
- 2) After you check in, and when there is space by your building, you will be directed to drive up to Crown. You will be allowed to drive only 2 vehicles up to the College to unload.
- 3) You will then have 20 minutes to unload your vehicle(s) at the curb near your building.
- 4) After quickly unloading, you will need to immediately move your car in East Remote and take the shuttle back up.

If you need to arrive after 3:30pm or at a later date, contact the Crown Housing Office at pandora@ucsc.edu before 5:00pm, Wednesday, September 14th to set up alternative arrangements.

As the other colleges will be moving in their students on Saturday, September 17, we will only be moving students in on Friday and Sunday.

**MOVE IN DAY TWO
CONTINUING STUDENTS
Sunday, September 18, 2005**

If you are a continuing student, you are asked to move in on Sunday, September 18th. In order to accommodate the number of returning residents, we have assigned you to a **2 hour** period to check in.

First stop is in the Crown lower C permit parking lot:

- 1) **You (the student) must show your red Check-In tag and a picture ID to pick up your keys.**
- 2) After you have picked up your keys and Room Condition Form (RCF), you will have approximately twenty (20) minutes to unload your car near your Res Hall or Apt Building. Bollards will *not* be removed and we ask that you not block a fire lane, hydrant, or park on the grass.
- 3) Out of courtesy for others arriving, please move your car as soon as you have unloaded the car.
- 4) Return to your residence and complete your RCF.
- 5) Return the RCF to the C-lot during the **9:00am-2:00pm** and retrieve your picture ID.

If you plan to return later than Sunday, contact the Crown College Housing Office at pandora@ucsc.edu before 5:00pm, Wednesday, September 14th to set up alternative arrangements.

As the other colleges will be moving in their students on Saturday, we will only be moving our continuing students on Sunday.

As we will be busy with Orientation, we ask that continuing students wait until Sunday to move-in to assist with the traffic and safety of our community.

What to Bring

Not sure what to bring? Here are some ideas. Also, downtown Santa Cruz (a bus ride away) has plenty of shops if you can't fit it into your car!

YES!

- ✓ buy ahead of time: extra long twin sheets (beds are 80" x 36"), mattress pad/plastic cover, blankets, pillows, bedspread
- ✓ bath necessities! Toothbrush, tooth paste, shampoo, hair dryer, soap, razor, feminine hygiene products, robe, shower shoes, and bath towels
- ✓ desk lamps, plants, posters (use poster tape)
- ✓ alarm clock (with backup battery in case of power outages)
- ✓ emergency items: flashlight, surge protector, batteries, aspirin
- ✓ personal papers: ATM card, checkbook, Social Security card, copy of birth certificate, health insurance card, and driver's license
- ✓ lots and lots of quarters for laundry
- ✓ bicycle - don't forget the U-lock and helmet
- ✓ heavy raincoat, rain shoes, and a sturdy umbrella (it does hail)
- ✓ laundry supplies: soap, iron, hangers, laundry bag/basket
- ✓ office supplies: stapler, scotch tape, ballpoint pens, pencils, paper, bulletin board, highlighters, backpack, envelopes, stamps, scissors
- ✓ coffee maker, hot pot, small fridge, microwave, blender, tupperware
- ✓ computer and printer, paper, ink cartridges
- ✓ head/ear phones (the walls are thin), stereo, discman, favorite CDs
- ✓ telephone (see under "Community Services" for more info)
- ✓ apartment residents only: toilet paper, paper towels, garbage bags
- ✓ apartment residents only: dishes, flatware, dish towels, toaster/toaster ovens, rice cooker, groceries

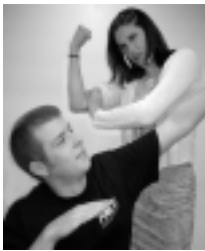

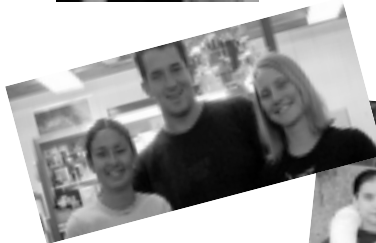

Community Services

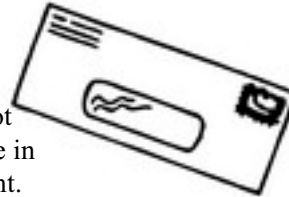
Campus Housing Office



As a Crown student, you'll interact with 3 related housing offices. Contact the Campus Housing Office (CHO) at if you have questions about the housing contract, meal plans, or payment plans. The Crown Housing Office is where you go with questions about room assignments, room conditions, filing periods, and processes. The Residential Education Office is where you'll go with questions about most other day-to-day aspects of your residential life (key lockout, judicial sanctions, roommate conflict).

Mail Services

Every Crown student is assigned a mailbox at the College, located in the Gatehouse across from the Admin Building. The address is valid for one academic year. Your specific college address is not included in this packet, but will be made available in September (for Fall) via your UCSC email account. Winter Quarter admits will receive it in December.



Be aware that there is a limited amount of storage space in the Gatehouse so you **MUST** arrange for your packages to arrive **AFTER** you do! If your packages (meaning, if all your clothes and other belongings) arrive before you, the mailroom will return them to sender.

ResNet

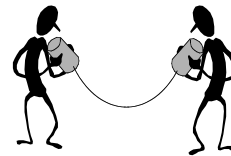


ResNet provides Internet access and computing support to the campus. There are Ethernet ports in all bedrooms. All you need to take advantage of your Internet port is an Ethernet capable (or up-gradeable) computer with the appropriate configuration. The ability to make local and toll-free calls is included in your rent. You will need to provide your own touchtone telephone. There is one telephone line and voicemail box assigned to each single or double room. Triple rooms have 2 lines and voicemail boxes. This means that multiple residents in a room will need to share. We urge you to set up your voicemail so you can receive important messages from the College. 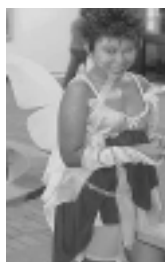

CROWN STUDENT SENATE (CSS)

Frequently Asked Questions



“Can I move in early?”

Move-in dates and times are specifically structured to accommodate the large number of students moving in across the UCSC campus. **Early move-in is by special exception only.** Contact the Crown Housing Office (pandora@ucsc.edu) for details.

“What if I change my major?”

“Do I need to switch colleges?”

No. The purpose of the College is to provide the smaller, less anonymous community atmosphere that is often lost in larger universities. Each college provides its students with a mailbox, advising staff, and college programs (including a student government). On your diploma, it will state that you graduated from the UC Santa Cruz. Most every class, especially for frosh, will be held in large lecture halls throughout the campus. You will be able to pick labs and discussion sections that may be closer to home.

“I asked for a single. Why wasn’t I assigned one?”

There are only a limited number of single rooms. During Room Selection held in the previous Spring, most single rooms are allocated to continuing (enrolled Crown residents) students.

“I’m an older transfer student so why have I been assigned to the halls?”

Apartment spaces were assigned to continuing students during Room Selection. Transfer students were placed whenever possible based on best fit with the established household.

“Do I have to move out over the Quarter breaks?”

Your housing contract spans the academic year, so unless you are approved to cancel your contract or switch rooms, your room is yours for the year. Your contract expires on Friday, June 16, 2006. We will expect you to leave residence by noon.

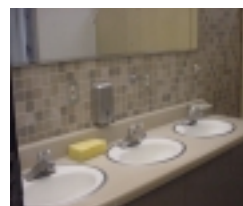

“What is the policy for overnight guests?”

Residents may have a guest stay in his or her room/apartment for a maximum of 3 consecutive nights or 15 total nights per academic year. However, this is also a household/roommate issue and should be discussed as you set up your household rules. Having guests does create disruption in your housemates lives so please take that into consideration.

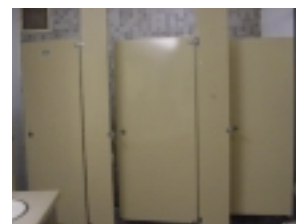
“How private are the bathrooms in the Residence Halls?”

There are bathrooms on each floor which means that roughly 14-17 residents share a common area of toilets, sinks, and showers. In each of the halls, there is also a bathtub on the first floor. All the toilet stalls have a locked door. All the showers have a ceiling to floor curtain and there is also a changing stall with a ceiling to floor curtain. It's rare that everyone will be using the bathroom at once, so there is usually ample privacy. Residents in a hall are not restricted to using the bathroom on their floor (unless there is an All-Female restriction) and women who would feel more comfortable using an all female bathroom are welcome to use one if it is located in their building.



“I asked for an all-female floor in the residence halls. Why was I not assigned to one?”

There are only 2 all-female floors in the complex. If you were assigned to a coed floor and had wanted an all-female floor, most likely you have been placed in the same building as an all-female bathroom. The floors typically have an equal balance of females to males.



“How do I get on the wait list to move?”

Two weeks after the quarter begins, we fill the vacancies. If you'd like to be put on a waiting list, talk to your CRE. However, if you would like to move solely based on roommate conflict, you should contact your RA or CRE, who can help you.

"I got assigned a double room in the residence halls with someone that I don't know. What should I do?"

If your roommate allowed us to release his/her phone number and/or email address, you are advised to contact him/her and introduce yourself. Some topics you may want to find out include: major or interest of study, study habits (library, room, silent or with music), tv habits, hobbies and activities, overnight guests, boyfriend/girlfriend, and sleep habits.

"What if my roommate did not release any information?"

Hopefully when your roommate notices on the assignment letter that s/he did not release any info, s/he will get in contact with you first!

"What if there is no roommate listed on my letter? Does that mean that I have a single?"

No, your initial roommate may have cancelled recently and no one has been assigned yet to the vacancy.

"I'm a continuing student and picked during Room Selection with my friends, but in my packet there are different names listed. What happened?"

Your roommates probably cancelled their housing contracts over the summer and you have been assigned new roommates. If you have questions, you should contact your friends to see what the situation is. If there is an error, please have them contact the Crown Housing Office as soon as possible.

"What happens if my roommate leaves during the year?"

A new roommate will be assigned to the space. This could be an immediate process or one that will take a few weeks depending on when the vacancy has become available and the housing waiting list. You should expect to have a new arrival at any time and make sure that there is a space for the new roommate to place his/her belongings.

"I am female and my guy friend and I put each other down as roommates. Why did you not put us together?"

At UCSC, all rooms are assigned same gender roommates. However, mutual requests were honored and you and your friend are most likely on the same hall.

Student Life Staff

ASSOCIATE COLLEGE ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICER (ACAO)

Sarah Woodside is responsible for overseeing the Student Life functions of the college, including Residential Education, Housing, College Programs, and a variety of services designed to make Crown a safe, open, and productive environment.



COORDINATOR FOR RESIDENTIAL EDUCATION (CRE)

Carly White (lower quad CRE) and **Joseph Johnson** (upper quad CRE) are 2 of our 3 full-time professional staff members responsible for a residential area at Crown. They train and supervise student residential staff, provide support and resources through programming, referral and one-on-one interactions, and are also responsible for upholding college and university policy.



RESIDENTIAL ADVISORS (RA)

Crown has 2 RAs per residence hall living on the second and third floors and 1 RA per 2 apartment buildings. These undergraduate upper-division students serve as paraprofessional staff. Their duties include planning educational, social, and cultural activities, providing a safe, secure, and academically successful environment. If you have roommate conflicts, you should discuss them with your RA.

FOOD SERVICE ADVISOR (FSA)

Crown has 1 FSA to act as a liaison between University Dining and residents. Residents can talk to the FSA about suggestions to improve services or submit recipes for suggested entrees.

HOUSING COORDINATOR (HC)

Darlene Miyakawa is responsible for making housing assignments, assigning move-in times, administering room switches, cancellations, check out, and damage charges as well as producing the college publications.



STUDENT LIFE OFFICE MANAGER (OM)

Joao Simas can provide you information about programs, lockout assistance, and is responsible for daily operations of the office.



OFFICE ASSISTANTS (OA)

We have student workers who help maintain the Student Life Office daily responsibilities.

COLLEGE PROGRAMS COORDINATOR (CPC)

Serena Dionysus creates a variety of events for the entire college community including orientation, graduation, and College Nights. The CPC also advises the Crown Student Senate.



PROGRAM ASSISTANTS (PA)

We have student workers who help create and produce the College Program Office activities.

FALL ORIENTATION LEADERS (OL)

OLs assist with opening day and orientation week events, serving as peer mentors for new students.

SPECIAL PROJECTS COORDINATOR (SPC)

Allen Bushnell handles room reservations and supervises the webmaster and mailroom plus manages outreach activities.



FACILITIES STAFF

Ben Doniach and **Bill Miller** handle the residential maintenance. If you have a water leak or you notice that there is a stopped drain in the bathroom, you should file a fixit ticket and they'll come work on the problem.



COMMUNITY SAFETY OFFICER (CSO)

Curtis Swain, **Joseph Carter**, and **Scott Randle** provide safety and security to UCSC residential communities, both on and off campus after regular business hours and on weekends.



Crown Core Class



Crown's core class, "Ethical Issues in Emerging Technologies" will explore emerging issues in science and technology such as bioengineering, information systems, artificial intelligence, and animal rights. It will examine the ethical challenges we face as our world is now regularly and cataclysmically transformed by the sciences.

LECTURE AND SECTIONS

The Crown Core Course consists of both a lecture and sections. The lecture meets some Mondays and Wednesdays (shown on the syllabus handed out at the Special Lecture meeting) from 7:00-8:45pm in Classroom Unit 2. Section times vary and are listed in the Fall Schedule of Classes under the heading "Crown College."

ENROLLMENT

You cannot enroll in the Crown Core Course until Thursday, September 22. Also, the Admissions Office must have entered your exam score reports (AP, IB, SAT II, AWPE). The AWPE scores are automatically received by UCSC, but for the AP, IB, and SATII, you must request to have your official examination scores sent to the UCSC Admissions Office. You can check online at the Student Portal (line - view Test Scores) to see if your test scores have been received.

SUMMER READING/WRITING ASSIGNMENT

Core is first-and-foremost a writing/reading/critical analysis course. Here you will polish your writing and seminar discussion skills, a crucial first step to success at UCSC. To prepare you for Core, a summer assignment was separately mailed to you and is also posted at the Crown College website: www2.ucsc.edu/crown. meeting.
